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KIM'S STORY

This is the story of my life. For as long as I can remember, my biological father had custody of my older brother and me. My dad was an alcoholic. My dad never cared what my brother and I did. I wasn't any older than seven or eight years old and we would be running the roads at two or three in the morning getting into trouble. At age eight my dad started molesting me. I did things to get into trouble with the law, trying to be taken away so I could be safe so I could try and tell. But it never worked. Finally we moved to a new school. I wasn't happy about leaving my old friends but it was like there was some kind of hope. My brother started dating a girl from our new school. One day he came home a little late. My dad was drunk and knocked him off of the four wheeler backwards. My brother's girlfriend's parents came and picked him up that night. The next morning I was dropped off in their driveway. They took me in just like I was theirs. They became my foster parents. I was finally safe. I had medical problems and my foster mom knew there was something wrong. She asked me and I started crying. I was scared but at the same time I was like "Finally I don't have to go back, it's finally over. "Yet it had just begun. Going through many questions over and over, a lie detector test, court hearings I began to question myself, "I should not have said anything". I began to think they didn't believe me and he was going to get away with it. I was going through so many emotions I didn't know how to deal with them. The only type of relief I had felt was through self-mutilation. My foster mom cared too much to see me hurt myself. She got me help and I came to Brooke Place to understand my feelings and to establish a relationship with my biological mother. That was not to be. My mother could not stand up and take the roll of being a mother she needed to be. I started doing the program to work on how I could cope in positive ways. I never planned to graduate high school. I was going to drop out and get out of this state. The counseling, the groups, and the caring of staff at Brooke Place helped me find and use positive coping skills. I learned different coping skills for the different moods I was in. When I graduated school in June 2009, I moved out on my own, got a job, and bought my own car. Now I work fifteen hours a day. The best part of being able to cope and deal with my demons is now I am the mother of the most amazing three year old. I am married to my best friend of nineteen years. My wife and I are working towards our goals and dreams in life. We would like to buy our own home with land and hope to make our family a little bigger. Before I go, I would like to say one thing: Always remember "It doesn't matter where you came from or what you have been through, you choose the path you want to travel down."
